## What to Know

Disinformation thrives when policy is unclear. Host briefings or distribute digestible fact sheets on policies, laws, or bills that have the potential to cause harm. Policy literacy is most effective when it includes actionable advice on what your audience can do to make a positive difference or protect their rights.

## Doing It Right

Legal language can be tricky. Collaborate with human rights lawyers or policy specialists to make sure you get the details right. Use clear, non-academic language. Provide FAQs and myth-busting resources that highlight what the relevant policy does and doesn't say to provide clarity and resist over-compliance.

## Evaluating Success

Everyone is more confident. Educators stop self-censoring when there is no legal or professional reason to do so. Parents voice fewer complaints and administrators are more informed when answering the concerns that do come in.
